CITY COUNCIL MEETING
May 16, 2017**

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 6:30 pm.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

MAYOR'S COMMENTS - LONG LAKE NEWS, MEETING REVIEW AND UPDATES

Mayor Schneider offered the following comments and updates:

Mayor Schneider was saddened to receive a call from Kurt Kaminski, who has decided to resign his position on the City Council effective immediately. On behalf of the Council, he thanked Kaminski for his years of dedicated service and wished him the best.

On Memorial Day, May 29, commemorative ceremonies honoring the services of veterans will be held at:

Union Cemetery at 9:15 am, parking to be available courtesy of Birch's on the Lake.

St. George's Cemetery service begins at 10:15 am.

A program will be held at the Long Lake Veterans Memorial in Nelson Lakeside Park beginning at 11:15 am.

Mayor Schneider noted that for those interested in purchasing a paver stone at the Long Lake Veterans Memorial to honor or memorialize the services of a veteran, there is a process ready and available to do so. The cost to purchase a paver is \$150, and order forms are available by contacting City Clerk Moeller. He added that if the cost to purchase a paver would be a financial hardship, he had learned there is a veterans organization that may be able to anonymously provide financial assistance in those circumstances.

Long Lake will be having its first gardening contest, with more details coming some time after Memorial Day. April Wysocki of the Country Cake Cupboard, with help from business district and community members, have spearheaded this new event. The hope is that prizes may be awarded at the revitalized SummerFest later this year.

On May 8, Mayor Schneider attended a Regional Council of Mayors meeting. The topic of discussion was to learn more about the ability for cities to become recognized as a "green city", and the

potential for grant opportunities that may accompany a green city designation. Some discussion focused on resourcing grants and funds to clean up properties and enable property redevelopment.

For a water quality update, Mayor Schneider had loaned Council member Dyvik a secchi disk to help identify the depth of the water quality. Council member Dyvik observed that on May 7, water was clear down to 18 feet; and on May 14, water was clear down to 12 feet. This appears to represent an improvement over some years.

APPROVE AGENDA

The agenda was amended to add Item No. 14, Resignation of a Council Member and Resolution Declaring a Vacancy on the City Council for Appointment of Member to Fill Unexpired Term.

A motion was made by Dyvik, seconded by Jerde, to approve the Agenda as amended. Ayes: all.

CONSENT AGENDA

The Consent Agenda consisted of:

A motion was made by Skjaret, seconded by Jerde, to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. Ayes: all.

OPEN CORRESPONDENCE

Dale Richardson, Commercial Building Service - Mr. Richardson had appeared under Open Correspondence to voice his concern during the EDA meeting as well. Mr. Richardson stated that he does not feel it is proper for a City not to respond to people, nor right for the EDA to table an application and not take further action. He objected to the EDA accepting proposals when others have not been acted upon, discussed his perceived benefits of his proposal, and indicated the EDA's procedures were bad for business and bad for the City. He stated that he does not receive responses to correspondence sent to the City Administrator. He added that he's been in business for excess of 40 years, has dealt with major cities in the metropolitan area, and thinks it is crazy his project could not get consideration here in Long Lake. He believes one proposal was tabled, and a second proposal was denied opportunity to be on an agenda, and legally he did not feel he could be blocked.

Jane Davidson, 1020 Old Long Lake Road – Ms. Davidson indicated she was appearing before the Council voice continued objections to the portion of the County Road 112 Phase 2 project involving the intersection of CR 112 and Old Long Lake Road. Since her appearance at the last Council meeting, the County has brought forth another proposal for configuration of the intersection, and she and her neighbors object to the revised proposal as well. She displayed the new proposal on the overhead camera for the Council to view and discussed the features of the new proposal, which would include the addition of turn lanes and a large center median in the center of Old Long Lake Road. The center median is objectionable as it would mean the homeowners at 1010, 1020, 1030 Old Long Lake Road and 1070 W Wayzata Boulevard could not take left turns. To reach their homes, they would need to drive down their street, turn around in a neighbor's driveway, and come back to their residences. They could also not take a left from their driveway to locations further

down Old Long Lake Road. She also indicated a landscaping plan for this area does not appear to exist as well. She urged the Council again to support the neighbors and their concerns about the intersection, further encouraging the Council to limit truck traffic to local truck traffic only on the roadway.

She also showed photos of her deck railing which depicted how much asphalt dust is currently coating her railings as a result of ongoing County Road 112 project work. She was aware the contractor was seeking an option in Long Lake or Orono to allow them to do pavement crushing in proximity to the work zone. She asked the Council to keep an eye on these activities, noting that this asphalt dust is a health danger in addition to a cleanup issue. She assumes the dust reached her property as winds traveled over the lake.

BUSINESS ITEMS

Public Hearing: Consider Adoption of Five Year Street Reconstruction Plan and Issuance of General Obligation Street Reconstruction Bonds

Jason Aarsvold, Ehlers & Associates, reported that in a prior work session, the City Council had provided direction to staff and consultants to utilize cash from various sources of funding so that a proposed bond issuance would not exceed \$2 million. The City typically issues 429 General Obligation assessment bonds to complete the planned street reconstruction projects; however, for the 2017 and 2018 street reconstruction improvements (County Road 112), the City is unable to meet the minimum assessment threshold because it is a County road and therefore would need to finance the project through the Street Reconstruction Bond process instead. This authority granted to cities generally exempts city bonds issued under a street reconstruction and overlay program from the referendum requirements usually required for bonding expenditures. To utilize this type of financing, the City has to prepare a 5-Year SROP which is presented at a public hearing to solicit comment and feedback from the community. The SROP has been included in the Council's packet for review and consideration. Upon conclusion of the public hearing, Aarsvold clarified that the Council must approve the SROP via a unanimous vote of the members present.

Aarsvold indicated that the pre-sale report provided reflects a 16 year term, or 15 years of principal payments on the bond issue. The bond issue will be rated by Standard & Poors, and bonds will be sold competitively. As it looks at this time, the City will need to review the way utility rates are structured in order to pay the debt service on the bonds. He added that if utility funds aren't sufficient in future, the tax levy would need to be raised. The bond sale is anticipated for June 30, with bonds being available to pay for project costs in July.

Mayor Schneider asked that Aarsvold articulate the connection of the SROP to the road, which in this case is not City owned but is a County roadway.

Aarsvold explained that under the authority granted by the Street Reconstruction Bond process, bonds can be issued to pay for a City's portion of a County road project. The authority to issue bonds for this purpose is granted by statute.

Council member Skjaret reflected that the decision represents the City using some financial resources set aside for a number of years, while still maintaining funds in reserve; and contributing to the project cost outright, while being careful.

Mayor Schneider noted that in rough terms, if the County road project cost is \$16 million or more overall, the City's portion is approximately \$2.5 million.

A motion was made by Skjaret, seconded by Dyvik, to open the public hearing at 7:05 pm for comment on the 2017A Street Reconstruction Bonds and SROP. Ayes: all.

Hearing no comment, Mayor Schneider entertained a motion to close the public hearing.

A motion was made by Skjaret, seconded by Dyvik, to close the public hearing at 7:06 pm. Ayes: all.

City Attorney Thames advised that if the Council had no further discussion, they could move forward to vote on Resolution No. 2017-20.

A motion was made by Dyvik, seconded by Skjaret, to approve Resolution No. 2017-20 adopting a Street Reconstruction Overlay Plan (SROP) and approving the issuance of General Obligation Street Reconstruction Bonds. Ayes: all.

Consider Application for Therapeutic Massage Enterprise License - Lucky Massage, 432 Mill Street; Consider Applications for Massage Therapist Licenses - SanBei Lin and Shengying Wu of Lucky Massage, 432 Mill Street

City Clerk Moeller reported that Long Lake City Code, Chapter 10, Businesses, Article VI. Massage Services requires that massage services businesses within the City be licensed as a Therapeutic Massage Enterprise in order to offer massage services. Additionally, City Code requires that individual massage services practitioners be licensed as a Massage Therapist affiliated with a licensed Therapeutic Massage Enterprise before providing massage services.

On March 27, 2017, City staff received the following applications for massage services licensure:

- An application for a Therapeutic Massage Enterprise License by Lucky Massage located at 432 Mill Street, owned by Sanbei Lin.
- An application for a Massage Therapist License by Sanbei Lin to allow the provision of massage services at Lucky Massage, 432 Mill Street.
- An application for a Massage Therapist License by Shengying Wu to allow the provision of massage services at Lucky Massage, 432 Mill Street.

The above applications submitted were found to be complete. Both individual applicants are currently new members in good standing of the Associated Bodywork & Massage Professionals organization; and were able to meet all of the educational requirements for licensure, providing certificates and transcripts documenting they have exceeded the minimum training requirements as set forth in City Code. Staff completed both an on-site inspection and follow up inspection of the premises at 432 Mill Street and has verified that health, sanitation and facility standards have been met.

The background investigation of both applicants as completed by the Police Department resulted in no criminal findings that would disqualify the applicants from eligibility for licensure; however, there is concern that the applicants may not appear to meet the standard that requires applicants to be of "good moral character and repute". Moeller referenced the specific sections of City Code stating that no license may be issued to an individual, entity operated by an individual, or person who "is not of good moral character or repute". She also referred Council members to the Memorandum prepared by Wayzata Police Chief Michael Risvold, dated May 11, 2017, regarding the Lucky Massage Background Investigation.

Staff is recommending the City Council consider the information presented and take action to approve or deny the licenses requested. Moeller added that due to an emergency health situation, the applicants were not present at the meeting. Their interpreter, Mr. Tony Chang, is present and able to speak on their behalf.

City Attorney Thames advised that it is important to note the applicants have complied with directives and have no disqualifying convictions. What the Council has is an issue where the ordinance states "of good moral character or repute", and the Council has to determine if the information available through the application process meets the standard for a denial of licenses solely on that criteria, or to approve the licenses. Evidence presented is largely circumstantial. The undercover operation a few years ago did not result in an actionable offense, but actions uncovered were not necessarily appropriate for licensure. What has been determined by the Chief during his ongoing investigations is that alleged activities and online report of inappropriate conduct have taken place during the current ownership of the business. He noted that a number of the online postings regarding conduct at the establishment did occur after the undercover operation incident.

Thames also noted that the building owner had submitted an email in support of her tenants and discussing the long-lasting nature of online search results. Thames acknowledged that it is very difficult to take things off the internet; however, online content as recent as June 2016 without a doubt represents current ownership.

Thames further clarified that the applications are not in relationship in Section 32 of Zoning Code relating to Adult Uses, because the applications for consideration are for massage services, not for allowance of an adult use.

Council member Dyvik stated that websites like Backpage and Rubmaps maintain listings because someone chose to put them there.

Council member Skjaret commented that he has a real issue making a value judgment on someone's good moral character or repute. He indicated he would like to think decisions are made based on data and facts. Advertising content is protected by the first amendment. With no convictions, he finds it difficult to be faced with making a decision based on a value judgment.

A motion was made by Dvyik to deny the Therapeutic Massage Enterprise License by Lucky Massage and Massage Therapist Licenses to SanBei Lin and Shengying Wu, based on the background investigation Memorandum prepared by Wayzata Police Chief Michael Risvold. Motion failed due to lack of a second.

Mayor Schneider inquired as to whether the Council had any other motion at this time.

Thames added that there is an open application, with no affirmative vote or vote to deny. Direction should be provided as to whether they may reopen and do business while their application is pending, or whether the Council would not permit them to operate until licensed.

Mayor Schneider invited the applicant's representative, Mr. Chang, to speak on behalf of his clients.

Tony Chang, interpreter and friend of SanBei Lin, indicated that the applicants had moved here three years ago from California. Mr. Chang did receive the investigation memo and was aware of the undercover incident that had occurred. Regarding their online advertising practices, his clients do not speak English well and had utilized the services of a friend from California to advertise for them. His clients were unaware of the nature of the advertising content until last November, and

when they learned of the advertising, they asked their friends to remove or change the advertising. From now on, the applicants wish to be cautious in their business and to obey law and local ordinance, and have a better understanding of how they should do business. Unfortunately Mr. Lin is unable to be at the meeting due to health complications following surgery.

Mayor Schneider asked whether any Council members would wish to make any further motion.

A motion was made by Skjaret, seconded by Jerde, to allow Lucky Massage to operate for the next 60 days pending revisiting the massage licensing applications upon seating of the fifth City Council member.

Prior to the vote, Thames encouraged the Council to give consideration to what is the most objectionable part of the applications received at this time. If objection is to past conduct, we have the findings of the Police Chief's report. If objection is to ongoing conduct, during a 60 day period, staff could give direction to the applicants that this is an issue and instruct them to do what they can to repair the problem.

Council member Dyvik indicated that a temporary solution is not good enough for him because the client base of the business is already established. There has been inappropriate activity reported on websites, and reviews from these websites reporting the same kinds of activities. His concern is that there is a school bus stop one block away from this massage parlor, with his and other children there in proximity to this client base.

Mayor Schneider weighed in on the discussion. He did not feel that any vote today is a reflection on the character of an individual, but from his perspective was more of an evaluation of the facts in front of the Council. A reliance has to be given to findings from the Wayzata Police Department. Again, he does not feel the Council is acting in a judgment fashion, but rather is looking to interpret facts.

Hearing no further discussion on the motion, Mayor Schneider called the vote.

Ayes: Skjaret, Jerde. Nays: Dyvik, Schneider. Motion failed.

Mayor Schneider recognized that without a fifth vote by a fifth Council member, the Council's position remains unchanged. The applicants would be able to request their applications be revisited by the Council for action at the time the Council is fully seated.

Thames noted that as a point of clarification, the Council would first need to evaluate the massage business license and evaluate whether or not the business is fit to operate under the ordinances. As a process for deciding, he recommended starting with the business.

2016 Year End Fire Department Annual Report

Fire Chief Van Eyll made a presentation to the Council which summarized Fire Department operations during the year 2016, discussed trends in fire service calls, reviewed Fire Department staffing levels and retirements, and included goals from both personnel and training perspectives from 2016 and for the coming year.

Mayor Schneider asked Van Eyll whether the Fire Department would be planning to host another fall festival.

Van Eyll replied that there has been some discussion of doing so; however, no one has taken leadership of a fall festival event as of yet, so no dates are available. They may host a scaled back version of a FallFest event yet this year.

Authorize County Road 112 (CSAH 112) Project - Phase 1 Construction Administration Services

Jason Wedel of WSB & Associates introduced himself to the Council, indicating that he would be filling the role previously held by Chris LaBounty. LaBounty recently took a position with the City of Minnetonka. Prior to LaBounty serving as Long Lake's City Engineer, Wedel actually served as City Engineer for Long Lake and was involved in the Brimhall / Tamarack street reconstruction project. He brings some familiarity with projects and the community to his return to Long Lake, and although he's currently been at WSB for about four years, he has 23 years of engineering experience in both the public and private sector.

The revised proposal now being presented for the Council's consideration is for WSB & Associates to provide construction administration phase services for Phase 1 of the County Road 112 reconstruction project on a part-time basis. This will include reviewing shop drawings, attending necessary meetings with the contractor, and observing the replacement of City utilities at an hourly rate; and completing record drawings and utility as-builts of the work completed at a fixed cost. The proposal represents an awareness of supporting Public Works Director Goehring in his role as the lead, and making WSB's services available to him as needed.

Mayor Schneider deferred to Goehring, who indicated he and the Public Works crew have been on site frequently in the project area and on a day to day basis, the work is going well. He does recognize that WSB's services are a very valuable tool that can be employed, and he is especially in favor of the proposal including as-built survey work.

Mayor Schneider commented that for language consistency, he would like to add verbage stating "as requested by City staff" to the three hourly rate categories included in the proposal.

A motion was made by Skjaret, seconded by Dyvik, to authorize construction administration engineering services for the CR 112 (CSAH 112) Improvements – Phase 1, amended to include verbage stating "as requested by City staff" to the three hourly rate categories included in the proposal. Ayes: all.

Public Works Director One Year Performance Review

Administrator Weske reported that in November 2016, the Council adopted a resolution to approve changing Goehring's salary to Step 1 of the 2016 Salary Plan effective November 12; allowing him to use his accrued vacation time; and allowing him an additional six months to complete all certificates required by the Public Works Director position.

Goehring has completed all certificates required by the Public Works Director position. Upon completion of this probationary period, employee performance is evaluated by the City Administrator and a recommendation is made to the City Council as to whether or not the employee should become a regular employee. An adjustment in annual salary for the Public Works Director shall be considered at the time performance reviews are given by the Council provided a satisfactory performance evaluation is received.

The City Administrator's evaluation of the Public Works Director Jason Goehring is satisfactory. If Council agrees Goehring's evaluation is satisfactory, the City Administrator recommends appointing Public Works Director Jason Goehring to a regular employee with a salary increase to step 2 on the 2017 pay plan.

Mayor and Council expressed appreciation to Goehring for his efforts in his first year of employment.

Goehring thanked the Council for the opportunity, and he looks forward to learning new things and continuing to grow.

A motion was made by Skjaret, seconded by Jerde, to adopt Resolution No. 2017-19, upon a satisfactory evaluation from the Council, appoint Public Works Director Jason Goehring to a regular employee with a salary increase to step 2 on the 2017 pay plan. Ayes: all.

Approval of Shared Services and Equipment Agreement with the City of Wayzata

Goehring stated that the City of Long Lake and the City of Wayzata have been sharing services and equipment for many years. In addition, the Long Lake has been storing several pieces of large equipment belonging to Wayzata at Public Works year-round including the Calliope, an asphalt paver, an old tractor, and a sewer rodder. Seasonally, the City of Wayzata also stores three mowers and a utility vehicle.

The proposed formal agreement between the City of Long Lake and the City of Wayzata would clearly define the scope of the shared services and equipment sharing between the two municipalities. The agreement also defines the compensation to Long Lake for storing Wayzata's equipment at Public Works. The City of Wayzata will have its Jet Vac Sewer Cleaning machine and an operator available for up to 12 occasions annually, including both non-emergency and emergency events. Long Lake can save a considerable amount of money annually by utilizing Wayzata's sewer cleaning services, as a typical, non-emergency sewer cleaning event can cost between \$500 and \$1,000. The agreement would be in effect for a period of one year from the effective date and any party wishing to withdraw from the agreement prior to a new one-year term beginning may do so with a written 90-day notice. Staff is recommending adopting the proposed draft agreement subject to minor administrative changes per the City Administrator and City Attorney.

Goehring explained how Jet Vac Sewer Cleaning operates, and provided examples of incidents where access to this equipment would have been of help. He also noted Wayzata has approved the draft agreement.

Thames noted he had made some corrections to the draft that were largely grammatical. He also reviewed a few noteworthy substantive changes, including a change to indemnification language requiring that both parties name the other as an additional insured.

A motion was made by Dyvik, seconded by Jerde, to approve the Shared Services and Equipment Agreement between the City of Long Lake and the City of Wayzata as revised by City Attorney Thames, and to authorize the City Administrator to execute the final agreement. Ayes: all.

County Road 112 / Wayzata Boulevard W Reconstruction Project Updates

Goehring offered the following updates relative to the County Road 112 reconstruction project:

- A sheeting wall is now installed for stabilization in the former landscaped berm area along Wayzata Boulevard W, and the area is being prepared for construction of the bypass road.
- Watermain work is underway. Some initial hiccups were experienced due to the location of other utilities in the corridor, however those have been resolved and all in all, utility installation work was proceeding smoothly.

- Council members discussed the timeline for shoreline work to begin, noting that the County currently has indicated shoreline work is intended to begin next year, though if weather conditions cooperate for construction this year, they may begin the work later in the year.
- Council member Dyvik indicated he had attended an Orono City Council meeting last week and had heard discussion of the pavement crushing operation by the construction contractor. There was concern expressed about pavement crushing occurring in front of Otten Bros. and whether that would continue throughout the right of way. There was also concern about relocating pavement crushing to a MnDOT owned site which would be in proximity to residences. Curt Fretheim, Lake West Development, owns a property at the end of County Road 112 and was attempting to obtain a permit from Orono in order to facilitate leasing his space to the contractor for a pavement crushing site as well. Following the meeting, Council member Dyvik noted he had learned Orono had banned pavement crushing operations from locations. Administrator Weske indicated that Long Lake has been approached by the contractor, and they've asked about the possibility of utilizing the Virginia Avenue property or the property behind Public Works for pavement crushing operations. Goehring reported that at a construction meeting earlier that morning, the contractor raised the pavement crushing location issue and requested consideration of doing so at the property behind Public Works. Goehring indicated he'd advised the contractor he would not say yes or no to the request at that time. There has been some discussion of a willingness to trade upgrades in the project for the ability to crush pavement at the Public Works site. The first offer has already been extended, which would be for upgraded watermain infrastructure to be installed as a one piece boring pipe under the creek. Council and staff discussed the limited options available to the contractor for potential pavement crushing sites, as well as possible impacts to the Public Works site if the contractor's request were to be considered. After further discussion of impacts and the possibility of potential upgrades such as the upgraded watermain proposal, installation of conduit to enable future pedestrian crossing improvements in the corridor, and upgrading fencing along the lake from chain link to a more aesthetically pleasing material; the Council expressed a willingness for staff to explore the terms of an agreement for use of the Public Works site if financial considerations would make such a request a worthwhile discussion.
- Mayor Schneider had learned that the first short term construction closure to enable culvert replacement has been scheduled to take place around June 12. Birch's on the Lake will likely be requesting some consideration for parking accommodate, as Cemetery Road will not be available for their employee parking and will be open for emergency vehicle use only during that short term closure. Birch's is currently discussing the matter with the Fire Department.

Resignation of a Council Member and Resolution Declaring a Vacancy on the City Council for Appointment of Member to Fill Unexpired Term

Moeller reported that on February 7, 2017, the City Council took action appointing Kurt Kaminski to fill a vacant City Council member position, serving the remainder of a term effective through December 31, 2018. His letter of resignation, dated May 15, 2017 and received by City staff on May 16, is attached for the Council's review. The resignation of Council member Kaminski necessitates that the City Council adopt a resolution declaring that a vacancy exists on the Council, in order for the Council to appoint an eligible individual to complete the remainder of the unexpired Council member term. Staff recommends adoption of Resolution No. 2017-21 to formally accept the resignation of Council member Kaminski and to declare that a vacancy exists for the remainder of an unexpired term. Staff will prepare a press release announcing that applications will be accepted for the position, with applicants to be interviewed and appointed by the City Council at an upcoming meeting. Please note that if the Council desires, the Council does have the authority to immediately appoint an eligible person immediately after declaring the vacancy.

A motion was made by Dyvik, seconded by Skjaret, to adopt Resolution No. 2017-21 accepting the resignation of City Council member Kurt Kaminski and declaring a vacancy on the City Council for the remainder of a term expiring December 31, 2018.

Following the motion, after a discussion of the timeline for appointment, staff was given direction to post the vacancy with a deadline of June 13, 2017 for application submittal; interviews to be conducted at a special work session on Monday, June 19, 2017; and candidate selection and appointment to take place at the Tuesday, June 20, 2017 regular City Council meeting.

Ayes: all.

OTHER BUSINESS

LMCC Update – Council member Skjaret had attended an LMCC meeting last Thursday. Previously, he had reported that the LMCC had been in conversations with a telephone company wanting to provide cable services in the LMCC service area. While interest by telephone companies continues, further conversation has been on hold at this time. Looking ahead to the availability of 5G service and pending legislative action that would provide access to right of way for utilities overriding local zoning regulations, conversations remain suspended until the outcome of these issues is unknown. The bill as proposed would essentially provide utilities with unlimited control to install infrastructure.

Orono Council Meeting – Council member Dyvik noted that he had attended the most recent Orono City Council meeting due to his interest in water quality initiatives, as they were working to address their regulations on wetlands and setback requirements.

Meeting with Community Wireless Consultants – Weske had recently met with consultant Community Wireless Consultants in preparation for American Tower Corporation cell tower lease negotiations. Staff and the consultant are reviewing a variety of options, including accommodating infrastructure for 5G network service, and will be presenting information to the Council for their review in a closed work session.

Special Event Application – Moeller will be bringing a Special Event Permit application to the Council at their next meeting for the annual Gear West Twilight 5K and Kids Adventure 1K event.

Sandblasting Complaint – Weske indicated that about a month ago, Council and staff had received a complaint regarding sandblasting activities at Perry's in town. After a further review of public nuisance language in ordinance, at this time the activity does not meet the threshold for declaring a public nuisance. As such, while it is not a matter for City enforcement, it may become a civil matter between neighboring businesses in the future. Mayor Schneider affirmed he had also spoken with both parties involved and encouraged them to try and resolve concerns together.
